Did you know that artists as diverse as Rembrandt, Norman Rockwell and Andy Warhol all created works inspired by the game of Golf? The Art of Golf is comprised of 90 works and explores the royal and ancient game as depicted by landscape and portrait artists, photographers, pop artists, and sculptors through the ages. This is the first-ever exhibition devoted to the game by a major American art museum, bringing together art from the 17th century to today. Julia Forbes will present an exclusive behind-the-scenes lecture on how The Art of Golf exhibition was created for audiences in Atlanta in collaboration with National Galleries of Scotland. She will also explore the stories behind the paintings and how they represent “a game of considerable passion.”

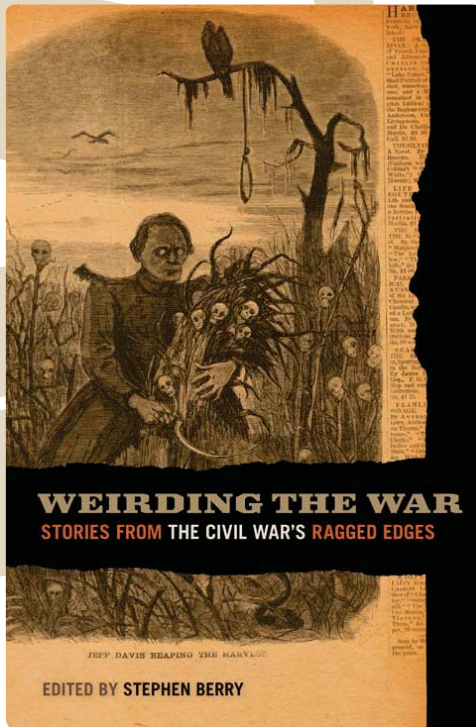

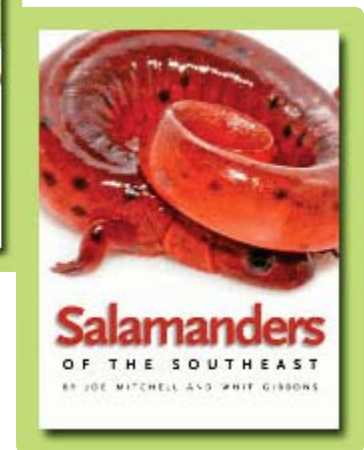
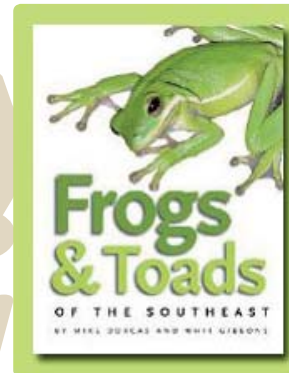

Whit Gibbons is co-author of the national award-winning five-volume series on reptiles and amphibians of the Southeast published by UGA Press. Among the hidden biodiversity of the region that he has written about are the nocturnal amphibians that are all around us and sometimes heard but seldom seen.



Amphibians are abundant throughout the Southeast, and Georgia is home to more than 75 distinct species of frogs, toads, and salamanders. Whit Gibbons will show examples of several of the unusual natives to the state, as well as common species that many people have heard of but never seen up close. Included will be the tiger salamander, one of the largest terrestrial salamanders of North America, that is often considered rare yet occurs throughout much of the southern half of Georgia. Included also will be one of the giant salamanders, which can reach lengths of greater than three feet but are seldom observed because of their secretive nature. Of particular interest because they are so often heard but not seen are the common Georgia frogs such as spring peepers that give their cheeping calls during winter, and bullfrogs that give their booming calls during summer. Whit will discuss the ecology and behavior of these and many other species of amphibians, using live specimens of regional frogs, toads, and salamanders.

Whit will be available after the presentation to sign copies of nature books he has authored, including *Frogs and Toads of the Southeast* and *Salamanders of the Southeast*.

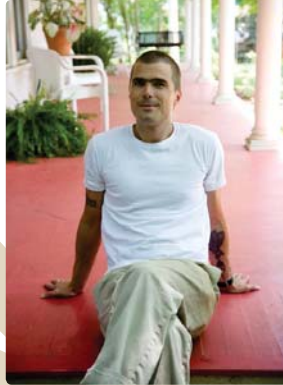

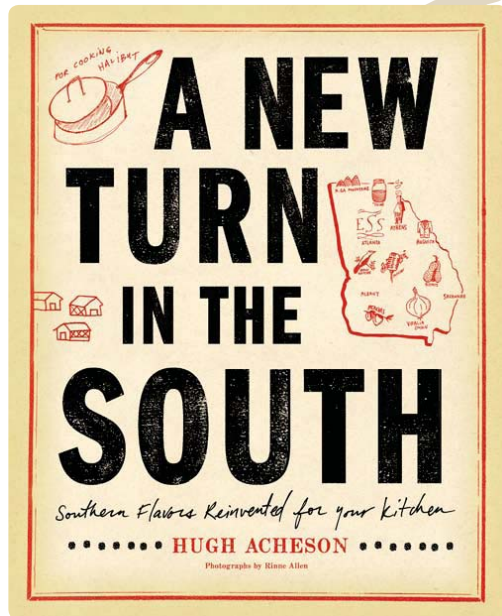

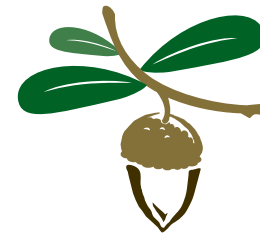
